Software:

While there is no required textbook for this course, it is highly recommended that you subscribe to the Adobe Creative Cloud. This gives you access to all the software covered in this course. The costs associated with the software vary depending on the length of subscription. Please see <https://www.adobe.com/creativecloud/plans.html> for additional information. You can either pay for a monthly subscription or an annual subscription paid monthly. The cost of a monthly plan is considerably more than an annual subscription. With that in mind, the tools covered in the class will benefit the student long after course completion with many students deciding to continue their subscription. Please make sure to be certain what plan you are signing up for. SBU and the instructor are not responsible for students' contract commitments. Due to the short duration of the Winter session, you may be able to complete the course with just a single commitment-free paid month.

The Adobe Creative Suite is also available **in University SINC Sites at no charge**.

The University provides free copies of Microsoft Office via the Office365 program. Visit office365.com, click on sign-in, and select "Work, School, or University." Use your full Stony Brook email account as your username and your *NetID* password.

It is strongly recommended to use a PC updated to at least Windows 7 for this class. Support for Mac is limited as we will be using the PC-based versions of the software covered.

Course Learning Objectives:

This course introduces computer applications and a selection of multimedia tools and the skills necessary to be successful in today's digital world including the creation of digital graphics, animations, and the production of audio and video using the following multimedia tools: Adobe Animate, Adobe Photoshop, Adobe Illustrator, Adobe Audition, and Jing. Students will learn effective information presentation skills using the Microsoft Office Suite, wikis, blogs and other social media tools. The course emphasizes multi-media literacy, design and presentation skills. Bonus points will be available for attendance during live lecture recordings and labs. Attendance is *not mandatory* but recommended during lecture recordings.

Students are expected to complete and present a portfolio of their multimedia projects. This will include a completed project from each of the 3 major software programs: Adobe Photoshop, Illustrator, and Animate.

Students will be asked to restore older print photographs to "like new" condition. This includes scanning them in an appropriate resolution, resizing them to an appropriate print size, and removing objects/defects from the photo using Adobe Photoshop. They will also develop their own vector-based logo using appropriate

Adobe Illustrator tools. Lastly, they will combine the skills learned from their Photoshop and Illustrator projects to complete an Animate animation. These projects will then be presented in the form of a final portfolio presentation.
