I.General Information

All graduate courses must be taken for a letter grade and passed with a B or better (except where otherwise noted); undergraduate courses counted towards program requirements must have a C or higher. Students must have at least a 3.0 GPA and have completed all program requirements (both content and pedagogy) to qualify for student teaching.

II.Professional Education Requirements

The methods courses must be taken sequentially, and students must earn a B or better in these two courses in order to remain in good standing and progress to the next course in the sequence. The field experience courses must be taken concurrently with the methods courses, and students will be required to repeat <u>both</u> courses if requirements for either course are not met. Students must earn a B or better in the student teaching seminar to meet program requirements.

III. Other Program and Certification Requirements

- 1. All students are required to pass a culminating interview before being accepted for student teaching. The interview will cover content knowledge, pedagogy, and dispositions. The interview can be repeated, though remedial work may be required.

- 3. For initial certification, students must pass the EAS, the CST, and complete seminars in child abuse, bullying, and violence prevention. A substance abuse workshop is also required for graduation.
- 4. To obtain New York State Teaching Certificaton, individuals must either be a US citizen or a legal resident.

Please note:

It is the student's responsibility to ensure that all requirements for the MAT- Social Studies degree are met. This advising worksheet should be updated by the student every semester to monitor progress.

IV. Content Area Requirements

Students must complete <u>five</u> graduate history courses above and beyond the 36 credits in history and social sciences required for admission to the program. Graduate students must also meet the distribution requirements specified on the next page. These requirements may be met by either the graduate courses taken towards the MAT degree or by undergraduate coursework. The MAT Program does not offer courses that satisfy the requirement for area 7. This requirement will have to be satisfied through an undergraduate course. Courses in world history may be used to satisfy one of the areas 4-6 if they address the history of that region in a substantive way. Undergraduate transcripts will be evaluated on an individual basis. Please note that undergraduate courses taken at Stony Brook to satisfy distribution requirements <u>do not count</u> towards full-time enrollment for financial aid purposes.
